Minutes of the Pierce County Flood Control Zone District are not verbatim; however, audio recordings are available upon request.

I. Call to Order

The meeting of the Pierce County Flood Control Zone District Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Chair Morell.

II. Roll Call

The Clerk called the roll.

Supervisors present: Dave Morell, Chair; Paul Herrera, Vice Chair; Bryan Yambe, Jani Hitchen, Amy Cruver, and Robyn Denson (Vice Chair Herrera and Denson joined after roll call.)

Supervisors excused: Rosie Ayala

Also present: Kjristine Lund, Executive Director; Athan Tramountanas, Ogden Murphy Wallace PLLC.; Kathleen Berger, Planning and Public Works; Jaire Winesberry, Communications Coordinator; and Brenna Price, Clerk to the Board

III. Approval of Agenda: Without objection, the agenda was approved as presented.

IV. Approval of Minutes: Without objection, the minutes of the July 9, 2025; and Special July 9, 2025, FCZD Board of Supervisors meetings were approved.

V. Public Comment: The Chair called for public comment; there was none.

VI. Resolutions

Vice Chair Herrera moved approval of Resolution No. 2025-6; motion seconded. The clerk read the title into the record. Lund briefed the supervisors on the proposal. Tramountanas provided additional details. Supervisors and staff discussed.

Chair Morell called for public comment; there was none. Supervisors discussed.

Resolution No. 2025-6 was approved on a roll call vote of 5-1. (Nay: Cruver)

Incident Summary

RIVERS



- Monitored river levels, forecasts, and river gauges to **provide situational awareness for responding agencies**.
- **Conducted Rapid Damage Assessments** of flood risk reduction infrastructure throughout the event.
- Held daily briefings with the US Army Corps of Engineers and other agencies regarding the **release of water from Mud Mountain Dam**.
- Obtained **aerial photos and video of the river systems** during a Dec. 12 flight in coordination with the Pierce County Sheriff's Office
- Made **emergency levee repairs** to the Puyallup and Carbon Rivers
- Conducted a **Comprehensive Damage Assessment** of the levee system the week of Dec. 29. PPW to develop repair plan based on findings



Incident Summary

ROADS



- **Addressed and monitored roadway issues** including water over the roadway, blocked storm drains, landslides/erosion, and downed trees.
- **Closed roads or lanes** as needed.
- **Inspected and repaired roads** damaged by landslides and flooding (in progress).
- **Inspected county bridges.**
- **Coordinated with utility companies** regarding trees of concern involved with utility lines.



Incident Summary

SOLID WASTE



- Conducted **property debris inspections**.
- **Provided roll-off boxes** from Murrey's at 4 larger sites.
- Gave **disposal vouchers and clean-up assistance** to affected businesses and residents.
- Shared **information on proper disposal** of certain types of solid waste.



Incident Summary

OTHER SUPPORT

Development Services

- Conducted **post-flood damage assessments** at over 50 locations with three teams of inspectors.
- Set up post-incident **expedited permitting process** for flood-damaged buildings.
- Worked with DEM to **integrate post-incident damage data** and photo collection.

Sewer

- Provided **around-the-clock coverage** at wastewater treatment plant.
- **Immediate on-site support in Wilkeson** when the town's wastewater treatment plant was overwhelmed by high flows.

Recommendations

Recovery and Support for Future Emergencies

Creation of a state-led voluntary buyout program.

- Acquisitions of flood-prone and Repetitive Loss Area properties.

Better support for those living in RVs before, during and after a flood, including recovery resources and funding for this type of housing.

- Temporary RV locations out of the flood zone (with amenities) where RVs can be moved to during an emergency.
- Contracted tow vehicles.


Recommendations

Funding Support to Reduce Flood Damage & Risk

- Post-flood acquisition funding support to **purchase substantially damaged homes from high-risk flood areas.**
- Expanded investment into **Floodplain Reconnection** projects.
